Sean Robichaud showed me it is possible to be creative and zealous and ethical in advocacy. And my father – though not in criminal - modelled for me that being a lawyer is about unpretentious hard work for your clients.

Hard to pick one favourite song. But to keep it on theme, a few great "criminal law"-related songs: the Grateful Dead's version of "Mama Tried" and The Band's "Long Black Veil" (for my money, the greatest song about an alibi defence ever recorded).

Can be hard not to take work stress home when you're really in it. But I have two young children and their interest in my litigation problems is mostly superficial. Plus my 3-year-old is oddly pro-Crown, so we mostly avoid talking about work which helps me disengage.

8- What would your defence bar colleagues be surprised to learn about you?
